

# Keys to the Courthouse



Many county government services are specifically spelled out in state law. For example, counties were established to ensure that justice is administered uniformly and to maintain key public records. But the Texas legislature has granted counties limited authority to provide other discretionary services according to local needs. Over the years, the Texas legislature has expanded county regulatory authority so that counties can address local problems.

Provisions from the American Disability Act will be considered when planning educational programs and activities. Please notify the Orange County Extension Office 5 days prior to event at 409-882-7010 if you plan on attending an Extension educational program and need specialized service. Educational program serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, disability, political beliefs or national origin. # 2012 Texas 4-H Calf Roping and Break-A-Way School July 17-21

The Statewide Texas 4-H Calf Roping and Break-A-Way School will be held at the Tarleton State University Equine Arena in Stephenville, Texas. This event has been developed in order to encourage young people in 4-H to develop leadership ability and to exercise their abilities in working with younger members in roping activities in 4-H. The participation is open to all districts of the state with applications being received as first come first serve basis. Priority will be given to boys and girls 12 years of age and older.

The cost of the school will be \$380 for the week. 

# **Garden Dip**

# Ingredients:

1 pkg (8 oz) cream cheese, softened

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

1 teaspoon Adams Reserve Dill Weed

1 garlic clove, pressed

1 plum tomato, seeded and diced

1/4 cup diced green bell pepper

1 small carrot, finely grated (about 1/4 cup)

Salt and ground pepper to taste

1-2 tablespoons milk

1 large red bell pepper

Assorted vegetable dippers

### Directions:

Combine cream cheese, mayonnaise, dill weed, and garlic; mix well. Dice tomato and green bell pepper. Grate carrot. Add vegetables to cream cheese mixture; mix well. Season to taste with salt and black pepper. Add 1-2 tablespoons milk to dip to adjust consistency.
