




Rice Cooking Contest Saturday Oct 4th

Roasted Pumpkin Seeds



Don't throw away the pumpkin seeds from your pumpkin! Toast them in the oven for a delicious and healthy Halloween.

Prep time: 10 minutes
Cook time: 35 minutes

Ingredients
One medium size pumpkin
Salt
Olive Oil



- 1. Cut open the pumpkin by cutting a circle around the stem end with a sharp knife (knife-blade angled in), an pulling off the top. Using a strong metal spoon to scrape the insides of the pumpkin and scoop out the seed and strings. Place the mass of pumpkin seeds in a colander and run under water to rinse and separate the seeds from everything else.
- 2. Measure the pumpkin seeds in a cup measure. Place the seeds in a medium saucepan. Add 2 cups of water and 1 tablespoon of salt to the pan for every half cup of pumpkin seeds. Add more salt if you would like your seed to be saltier. Bring the salted water and pumpkin seeds to a boil. Let simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat and drain.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 400°F. Coat the bottom of a roasting pan or thick baking sheet with olive oil, about a tablespoon. Spread the seeds out over the roasting pan in a single payer, and toss them a bit to coat them with the oil on the pan. Bake on the top rack until the seeds began to brown, 5-20 minutes, depending on the size of the seeds. Small pumpkin seeds may toast in around 5 minutes or so, large pumpkin seeds may take up to 2– minutes. Keep an eye on the pumpkin seed so they don't get over toasted. When lightly browned, remove the pan from the oven and let cool on a rack. Let the pumpkin seeds cool all the way down before eating.



Community Service

In 4-H, service is commonly defined as the voluntary action of an individual or a group of individuals without pay. Service to the community – through food drives, raking the yard of an elderly neighbor, adopt-a-highway programs, teens teaching younger youth, teens mentoring children or youth determining community needs and helping solve community problems – helps young people learn caring, leadership and citizenship.

Service Learning Project

Service-Learning is a strategy that integrates community needs, intentional learning objectives, and structured opportunities for reflection. Service-Learning projects take community service or volunteer projects to the next level by emphasizing both service and learning to create a more meaningful experience for youth.

Youth research homelessness in their community and contact local homeless shelters to learn about the types of services they provide. Youth then decide together on a service project that will support this community need. After planning and completing the service project, youth reflect upon both the Service-Learning process and the service project.

Citizenship

4-H strives to develop young people who are engaged and informed citizens. Through hands-on activities, members learn leadership, empathy, communication, and organization while expanding their role in decision-making processes. With intentional connection to their communities, youth come to understand "the big picture" and their role in civic affairs. 4-H Citizenship is the knowledge, Skills, attitudes and motivation that give youth the capacity to move beyond one's individual self-interest and to be committed to the well-being of some larger group.

By providing them with opportunities to connect to their communities and adult leaders, youth gain a clear understanding of their role in civic affairs and are able to build their decision-making ability.



Halloween Fire Safety Tips

- ⇒ When choosing a costume, stay away from billowing or long trailing fabric. If your child is wearing a mask, make sure the eye holes are large enough so they can see out.
- ⇒ Provide children with flashlight to carry for lighting or glow sticks as part of their costume.



- ⇒ Dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper are highly flammable. Keep these and other decorations well away from all open flames and heat sources, including lightly bulbs, and heaters.
- ⇒ It is safest to use a flashlight or battery-operated candle in a jack-o-lantern. If you use a real candle, use extreme caution. Make sure children are watched at all times when candles are lit. When lighting candles inside jack-o-lanterns, use long, fireplace-style matches or a utility

How to make it

To prepare them, just fill a serving bowl with your favorite vegetable dip. Wash and peel 4 long carrots for fingers and 1 medium carrot for a thumb.

With a paring knife (a parent's job), cut a flat, shallow notch in the tip of each carrot. Then use a dab of dip or softened cream cheese to glue a sliced-almond fingernail atop each notch.

Stick the fingers in the dip, as shown, and serve with plenty of peeled baby carrots for dipping.

- candy corn


Directions:

In a clear glass, layer pineapple, then oranges and top with whipped cream and a couple pieces of candy corn. Serve right away or refrigerate until ready to serve.





Pumpkin Cookies

Ingredients (Original recipe makes 3 dozen)

- 2 cups shortening
- 2 cups white sugar
- 2 cups canned pumpkin
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 6 tbsp butter
- 8 tbsp milk
- 2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup packed brown sugar

Directions

- Cream shortening, white sugar and pumpkin. Add eggs and mix well. Sift together the baking soda, ground cinnamon, salt and flour. Add to pumpkin mixture and mix well
- 2. Drop from spoon to cookie sheet. Bake 10 minutes at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 3. To Make Frosting: Cook butter, milk, and brown sugar until dissolved. Cool and add confectioners' sugar and vanilla. Spread over warm cookies.
